Beginner's courses

JAMES HENRIKS

My AGM Coaching Coordinator report for 2022/2023 mentioned that 22 club members had assisted as instructors over the 12 months at 8 courses. Many of the *22 legends* are also active as club officials.

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From a club with over 300 members that is a poor effort on behalf of the members who enjoy the facilities that the club has and the equipment provided.

The beginner's courses are one of the pathways for new members and raises over 40% of the club revenue. If you add in the money raised by the AJAD beginner courses, the members who assist at the courses are *in effect* sponsoring other club members.

The coordinator of the courses is required to be a qualified coach but the instructors simply need to be competent archers and be prepared to work with four beginner archers for three weeks.

Instructors do not have to be qualified level one or two coaches, though I encourage club members to take up opportunities that are offered during the year and I do recommend completing a "working with children" clearance (done online). I try to ease new instructors into the process by teaming them with an experienced instructor where possible.

THE SHOOTING COMMITTEE met on 30 October, to plan next year's events, including that we have a Longbow Tournament - the 'Intercalary Event', always on 29 February (every four years - leap day); also that the club pays half the entry fee for the Lord Mayor's Team Shoot. CHANGES TO CLUB REGULATIONS (rules governing operation of the club and shooting)

The following additions and clarifications were agreed to at the recent club meeting:

39. CLUB UNIFORM

39.1 There shall be a Club Uniform.

It shall consist of a green and gold shirt, or a gold shirt. An optional over garment of dark green and/or gold may also be worn. When it is raining, a rain-coat/jacket may be worn.

Please note that uniform rules will be enforced from the first programmed shoot next year This means that jackets, sweaters, vests, and so on of other colours will not be tolerated (put them UNDER your club shirt if you are cold). Do not blame the Field Captains if they refuse to allow you to shoot if you are not dressed as above; they are following the directions of the club membership (all club members are entitled to a vote at any club meeting) **SHOOTING RULES**

40.9B - During practice before programmed shoots (from 8am on Thursdays, 8am Saturdays (AJADs days only), 12 noon on Saturdays & Sundays), targets 1, 2, 3, 14 & 15 are to be used for distances up to and including 30m, while 4-13 can be used for longer distances (while adhering to rule 40.9 a) above), which may entail archers having to move to another target. 40.10 - 72 arrow rounds may be programmed at the discretion of the Field Captain.

The November beginner's archery course finished on Sunday 19 November. There were three no-shows on the first day so I suggested that the parent of one participant could join the group which he did the following week, with some catch up time with **Tony Ward.** One of the no-shows also joined Tony for catch up the second week.

The second no-show was ill and withdrew, and I did not have any communication from the third. Three did not appear the second week and two (siblings) the third week.

Bore water: Some good news: our water allowance for this financial year has been increased by 564 kL (which is unused water carried over from last year).

This gives us a total of 6,204 kL for the year. So far we have used 2,542 kL of that allowance.

FROM THE LIBRARIAN, STEVE SYKES

Bow International Edition 172 has arrived and, in addition to reports more relevant to archers in the UK, e.g. the Archery GB National Tours Finals, it contains a number of articles that will be of interest to our members.

In 'On talent and coaching, part 2, World Archery coach of the year, Richard Priestman discusses limitations, development and coaching.

In introducing children to field archery, Alex Tyler gives advice on how our smallest archers can start their journey in our sport. Safety and comfort are two key considerations for when a child should start using a bow. The use of indoor conditions and soft arrows with sucker cups is appropriately a suggested way for a safe introduction, especially at such a young age.

A new column starts a mindfulness mini-series by psychologist Karina on mental break-down. Mindfulness means being able to stop, notice and observe something and then giving yourself a moment to decide your response.

In the 'Recurve Archer's Drawing Arm' the author, James Park, looks at how an App can help analyse the biomechanics of the draw arm. The article concludes with details of where to find the app.

For those interested in thumb draw archery, Alex Tyler provides three pages of background and information, as an introduction for anyone considering a bit of variation in shooting style, especially for those who may have access to an Asiatic composite bow or a Turkish horse bow.

'Ask the Experts' is in two sections this month. The first focuses on barebow and in particular addresses questions on string-walking with regard to finger tabs and gloves. In the second, Jim Grizzly tackles instinctive shooting questions with reference to arrows and accuracy and the associated need for lots of graft and practice.

Finally, if you want some history and a chance to engage in some olde English, then the second part covering Roger Ascham's Toxophilus by Jan Sachers is an interesting read. To quote; "the best shootynge is always the most cumlye shootynge" made up of five components, *viz.* "standynge, nockynge, drawynge, howldynge and lowsynge."

Edition 172 will find its way on to the clubroom table by month's end when the previous issue will be available for short-term loan by members.

ANNUAL REPORT FROM THE TREASURER, KYLIE STEYN presented at the AGM in September

The financial statements of the club have been audited for the year ended 30 June 2023 [and can be viewed in the minutes].

Our club has significantly higher accumulated (cash) funds at the end of the 2022/23 financial year, \$352,961, an increase \$146,189, predominantly due to a \$100,000 grant received from the City of Adelaide Council which needs to be used for the building extension by end of 2024. A \$3,000 equipment grant was also received from the Office of Recreation, Sports and Racing (ORSR). The club also recorded a net surplus over the year with receipts higher than budgeted (particularly with respect to membership, coaching, tournament fees and canteen takings) while expenditure was lower than predicted.

Bank interest was not included in the budget as interest rates were negligible at the time when the budget was

prepared, and the accumulated funds for deposits were considerably lower. The coaching costs *and income* were both higher, as it was decided that the club would buy and include finger tabs as part of the beginner's course, but course fees were raised accordingly.

Club membership increased over the year from 278 to 294 members.

The Youth High Performance fund was closed, and the funds from this, combined with part of the Junior's fund, were disbursed to two junior members who were selected to compete internationally as decided at a club meeting during the year.

It was decided to depreciate the value of the club library by 50% to \$5 000.
